

## **San Diego**

There are many rules created for duplicate bridge players to help guide them into making proper decisions at the table. The first one I ever learned was the Rule of 11, which applies to 4th best leads. Since then, the Rule of 2/3/4 to apply to pre-emptive calls, the Rule of 15 for opening in the 4th seat, the Rule of 20 plus 2 quick tricks for opening 1 level bids, not to mention Mel's rules and a variety of others I am glossing over. The more rules I learn, the more I have yearned to create one myself. Something I can be proud of. Something that puts my name on the bridge map (since game results are not getting it there fast enough). Well, I may be on to something.

Recently I turned 65. Hard to believe, right? My dear wife took me to New York City to celebrate that achievement, and specifically to see the greatest sports team on Earth, not mention the Universe, the NY Yankees, play at a place some are now referring to as the House that Jeter built. Well, I don't know about that, but back to my rule. Everywhere we went, be it the 9/11 Museum at Ground Zero, the Theodore Roosevelt Birthplace National Monument, and the Tenement Museum offered me a Senior Discount. That made me wonder why bridge clubs don't offer Senior Discounts. Note to inquisitive self: maybe because the average age of an ACBL member these days is about 73. Thank you, statistical self. Well, there must be some age that would make sense for clubs to offer players a Senior Discount. Should it be 5 years above the ACBL average, 10 years, 15 years? Should it just be a nominal figure such as 80, 90, or 100? Those solutions seem a little simplistic, kind of along the lines of a flat income tax. I need a more progressive solution that accounts for genetic makeup, so that we all get a reasonable shot at cashing in on this upcoming Senior Discount. After all, it would not be fair if one's genetics promises you a life expectancy of 100+, versus a family line where out by 75 is the norm. OK, how do we do that? Larry's Rule of 5 should make a level playing field among players and not bankrupt club owners. Here's how it works: You take the mean age that your parents passed away at, add 5 (to account for life expectance increases), and presto, that is the age your Senior Discount shall kick in. Take me, for example. My dad passed at age 72 and my mom at 88. Take their average of 80, add 5, and start showing me my discount at 85. Wait a minute; I don't have the patience to wait 20 years on my Senior Discount, so I am hereby modifying the Rule of 5 to the average age minus 5.
